### Jim Smith

I have been fortunate over my lifetime to blend together some of my professional work and my academic studies with my personal interests. I have had over 35 years of professional expertise in owning and operating several businesses, including a resource consulting firm, an environmental drilling company, a real estate appraisal firm, and a farm. I have provided leadership, management, consultation, and facilitation for numerous projects and initiatives in sectors including agriculture, petroleum, government, First Nations, conservation, education, and research. I have provided counsel and valuation services to an array of national, provincial, and local land trust, conservation organizations. A favorite project involved working with multiple government departments and private organizations to facilitate creation of Alberta's first Heritage Rangeland designation on a combination of private and public lands and one of Canada's largest land conservation donations. I also provided expertise in facilitating one of Alberta's smallest conservation easement donations on a very ecologically important property.

As well as completing a PhD with a focus on sustainability /ESG, corporate social responsibility, and land use, I have provided leadership as chair and board member on the Olds College Board of Governors; as board member of Alberta Agriculture and Food Council, and the Sothern Land Trust Society; I was the founder and first president of Legacy Land Trust Society; and I am an active Rotarian.

I am now practicing retirement, although I am not very good at it! My wife and I have been volunteers in a small Mexican community where I help teach English in an elementary school. As a Rotarian, I approached our Olds Rotary Club, which very generously supported our endeavors with financial contributions to assist the parents and community members to obtain fresh water, working bathrooms, desks, and other classroom equipment. Several years ago we launched a school/ community garden



project, which may become a pilot for others in the area. As elsewhere, COVID-19 has created uncertainties in that environment as well.

Rivers are the threads of life for the communities they impact. As societies we need to make wise choices about how our rivers are used and cared for. My wife and I recently completed a donation of a conservation easement on one of our quarters that is cut by the Little Red Deer – that is probably a tangible indicator of why I might wish to support the work of the RDRWA.
